MISSING YOUR CLUB'S CHARTER????

Where Oh Where is Our Lions Club Charter???

I hope everyone is getting back to at least meeting virtually. I have Joined a new club and I am on the Board of Directors this year and the question came up that our club name does not match the name in the bylaws (Club Custom) and what is listed in MYLCI. The MYLCI name is the name the club was chartered under. Looking at the charter would be a logical course of action.

My club's charter was placed in a closet near the room where we met prior to COVID-19. It is now lost, and nobody knows where it is at this time. Not a good thing for the club. I bet this sounds familiar to several of the clubs in the District. If this is your club situation too, one continues to try to find this document, was it removed to a member's home or place of business. Like other licenses (Hunting Fishing and Drivers) this is your clubs license to operate as a Lions club. It is important for the current officers of the club to know the whereabouts of this important document. Note to club officers: should your club decide to fold for any reason this document must be surrendered to the current District Governor and sent back to Lions Club International, so knowing its whereabouts is critical to the club operation.

So, you cannot find the original—what then? The Club President or current Secretary can request a replacement Charter from the New Club division at Lions Club International at (630) 571-5466 and the club will be charged \$25.00 for the replacement. While that is good going forward, the loss of your history of the original charter with the signature of its first members is a tragedy. Based on this article I hope all the district club officers take the time to locate the charter document.

I have planned to make this a series of articles going forward. Next month Charter Night Celebrations—how to recruit new members and retain the older members.

Let me encourage you to visit the NAMI website on our district website <u>lionsdistrict2s3.com</u>. The resources page offers many items for your review.



DISTRICT 2S3 2020-2021 GOALS

1 REJUVENATE OUR DISTRICT WITH NEW CLUBS

GOAL: ADD TWO NEW CLUBS DURING NEXT YEAR.

We need to identify an area in the suburbs of North Austin to locate a club. It can be any type of club but with the demographics of the area, a specialty club of some type might work best. Equal consideration should be given to areas in the southpart of the District between South Austin and New Braunfels, possibly in the I35 corridor.

Guidance items:

- 1. Early in the year we will establish a working group with 2 committees. A North committee and a South Committee. These groups will work under and with the Governor team, NAMI Champion and GMT.
- 2. The committee timelines will be to have possible locations and recommendations ready for leadership by September 1, 2020.
- 3. Following the receipt of recommendations, the Leadership along with the Committee Chairs will select the focus location, determine the club type and establish a timeline for the formation of new clubs.
- 4. All information and preparation for the charter should be in place by February 1, 2021. The committee timelines will be to have possible locations and
 - 2 REVITALIZE OUR CLUBS WITH NEW MEMBERS

GOAL: THE ASSIGNED MEMBERSHIP GOAL FOR EVERY DISTRICT IS TO BE +1 FROM THE FINAL DISTRICT MEMBERSHIP ON JUNE 30, 2020. THAT GOAL WILL BE THE ONE WE FOLLOW.

Education and promotion will key the goal of new membership in our existing club.

- 1. The District IT program will emphasize communication of information to encourage and support membership. A specific goal is to increase the memberships' use of our IT program. The measurement is the report provided by District IT Duane Lueders after each month.
- 2. The District IT program and other leadership will encourage clubs to keep club information current on their websites, Facebook, and other social media sites that might be used by clubs.
- 3. The District IT program with support of a social media specialist will promote the activities of our Lion members on the District Facebook page.
- 4.. We will promote education through the training provided by our district GLT. The training goal is to have 60% of the Club Officers in the District trained about their office by October 31, 2020 We will inform members through various message types about the availability of educational material in the Lions Learning center.
- 5. We will train and support the work of our zone chairs. We will keep the Zone chairs informed about the status of their clubs and the things that are needed to accomplish our membership goal.
- 6. We must focus on retention. We can emphasize new members but we cannot do things that cause us to lose members that we already have The specific retention goal is to reduce drops in our District by 5% from the number that were dropped in 2019-2020.

We need to encourage our new member sponsors they need to know their work is not done at the new member initiation. Their work is just beginning. Sponsors need to ensure their new members find a home in the club and find things to do to be involved.

We as club members and club leaders need to be aware of the membership of our clubs. We need to recognize a member that is failing in attendance and participation. We need to make special emphasis to gt them involved. Secretaries need to track attendance and participation.

Leadership in clubs must let new members or different members take leadership roles in projects, offices, or other things that are part of a club's program.

3 MOTIVATE MEMBERS WITH NEW FELLOWSHIPS AND EXCITING SERVICE

Our clubs need to be aware of new ideas. That is why reporting is such a critical part of the LCI program. Each clubs' reporting is available to other clubs. Members using the reporting features of our LCI program can held other clubs find ideas for new service projects.

Leaders need to be willing to listen to new members for ideas. This helps with the task of getting new members involved in club activities.

Fellowship is also important. We have at least two avenues of fellowship our regular meetings and special events.

- 1. We need to ensure our regular meetings are conducted in an organized and timely way Organization and order is very good for the morale of the club.
- 2. We can have special events to stimulate togetherness, recognize members, etc. We need to use these opportunities as club leaders.

TEXAS LIONS CAMP—POLAR BEAR PLUNGE

In February Tex-

as Lions launched the biggest project at TLC since the inception of the camp – CAMPaign Vision 2020 & Beyond, a campaign to replace our bunkhouses, care -taker (summer staff) quarters, and basic infrastructure. This is sorely needed if our camp is going to be relative for another 70 years..... AND to kick things off, the Texas Lions Camp was selected by the Mo Ranch in Hunt, TX to be the beneficiary of the 28th Polar Bear Challenge on January 1, 2021 at 1PM. We hope you will use this honor given to our camp to help kick off CAMPaign Vision 2020 & Beyond with a BIG Splash! All the money raised will go to this capital building campaign.

We likely won't get chosen for this honor again for many years, but it gives us a perfect opportunity to get all our Texas Lions & friends thinking about our new "vision" for TLC's future....but to make matters more critical, the spring storms of 2020, destroyed bunkhouse 2, and severely damaged bunkhouse 1, plus summer staff quarters & some other buildings. It has become imperative to start our rebuilding sooner than later, if we want to continue to serve 1500 special kids each summer. Because of the pandemic, however, our Campaign has been virtually shut down so far, making the Polar Bear Challenge a timely opportunity to kick off the campaign.

- NOTHING CAN BE GLUED OR STAPLED TO THE POSTER—no glitter glue, no extra paper or objects. It cannot be mounted on anything, and must be able to be rolled into a tube for mailing.
- There must be an official Peace Poster Sticker (that comes in the kit) attached to the BACK LOWER RIGHT HAND CORNER of the poster. This sticker cannot be photocopied; it must be from a kit. Be sure this is filled out and signed by the parent of the child, as well as your president.
- Be sure that those who are judging your club's contest know the rules and the theme. Entering
 a poster that will be disqualified in the district contest is unfair to the other contestants in your
 contest that could have been a winner.

RAISING COMMUNITY AWARENESS IN THE PANDEMIC

As COVID-19 continues and social distancing is still a priority, many clubs have found alternative ways to meet, and small clubs may be meeting in-person. *If so, does your community know?* Here are some ideas to be sure your community is aware that your club is meeting and continuing to serve:

Website – Does your club's website prominently inform viewers of your meeting status? Do you have contact information for those with questions or seeking more details?

Newspaper article – If you have an interesting program scheduled, provide your local newspaper with a news release or media advisory. Be sure to include when and where the meeting will occur, and note that visitors are welcome. If you are meeting on Zoom, provide details on how to obtain the link.

Community calendars – Many television stations or cable companies have a Community Calendar. Request that your club meetings are listed by submitting the required information in a timely fashion. In some markets, you may be able to list regular meetings, and in others, it may be better to use this option for special events or programs of broad community interest.

Facebook/Twitter – If your club has a Facebook page and/or a Twitter account, are you using these social media tools to put out information about upcoming club meetings?

Whichever communications tools you use, be sure to include information about any service projects you are able to conduct. Also, if you have a fund-raising activity coming up, be sure to use these media channels to get the word out.

While working to generate publicity may take a little time and effort, your club will benefit in terms of community awareness and support, and potentially, new members!
